

Wolfskrieg 2010 Force Options & Composition (Final Edition):

1. General.

Any 1750pt force from the “Ostfront” or the upcoming “East Front” book will be allowed. Additionally, the following PDFs will be usable:

2. “1942 Compliant” Forces:

Though our main focus is on the Stalingrad Campaign (i.e. 1942) forces from 1943 will be allowed. Players who limit themselves to forces that are "1942 Compliant" will be primarily matched against opposing "1942 Compliant Forces." When a “1942 Compliant Force” out of necessity is matched against a 1943 force, the “1942 Compliant Force” will have a bonus “General Fire Support” (see below) added for that round. 1942 Forces will be primarily matched up against other 1942 forces whenever possible.

What are “1942 Compliant Forces?” These are forces that have equipment that would have been available for use in 1942 in the Stalingrad Campaign.

- a. For Axis forces the following equipment would **NOT** be part of a “1942 Compliant” force:

1. **Tiger Is, Panthers, Brumbars, Nashorn/Hornisse, Elephant/Ferdinand, Hummel, Wespe, PzKw-IVG (Late), PzKw-IVH, any tank team with Schurzen, and 8.8cm Raketenwerfer 43 (Püppchen), Panzerwerfers/R-Vielfachwerfer, Armored cabs on AAA Halftracks, and PzKw-III.**

- b. For Soviets the following equipment would **NOT** be part of a “1942 Compliant” force:

KV-85, SU-85, SU-76, SU-122, SU-152, and T-70 obr 1943.

- c. If there is something that you **KNOW** was not used in 1943 but did not make the above lists...just don’t use it if you are trying to get credit for running a “1942 Compliant Force.”

3. General Fire Support:

When a "1942" List faces as "1943" list during Wolkrieg 2010, the "1942" list will be reinforced with "General Fire support." These are batteries that are not dedicated to direct support of a force, rather they support many forces at the same time and may only be occasionally available to support any one force.

"General Fire Support" is similar to "Guns Across the Volga" rules in that the guns are always placed off board.

"General Fire Support" never counts as a "unit" for force morale or force total platoon/company count purposes as it is not actually part of the force, much like normal air support.

"General Fire Support" does have a staff and includes a Forward Observer Rifle Team (Fearless Trained for Soviets and Confident Vet for Axis). In addition a force Commanding Officer (CO) may also attempt to range in "General Fire Support" with the normal -1 modifier.

"General Fire Support" is not available every turn as it is also supporting other forces in the battle area. To check availability of "General Fire Support" roll a single die.

a. For Axis Forces: A roll of 4+ indicates that a German 150mm Battery (Veteran, AP5, FP2+) is available this turn.

b. For Soviet Forces: A roll of 3+ indicates that a Soviet 152mm Battery (Trained, AP5, FP2+) is available this turn.

"General Fire Support" can place a "Ranged in Marker" when it ranges it successfully, and if it is available again in the next turn may fire at the same target again automatically succeeding with the first range in attempt. If "General Fire Support" unavailable in the next turn, the "Ranged in Marker" is removed.

3. Two version lists.

Each player may submit a **primary** and an **alternate** list for their force. These two lists must have identical Combat, and Weapons platoons. The alternate list may change out up to **500pts** of **Support Platoon and HQ** options from the primary list.

4. BT-7s.

BT-7s were still in use during 1942 and should have been included in East Front. We have at least one play considering using BT-7s for this event and what follow is the rules for their inclusion. BT-7 can only be used in a "1942 Compliant" list and can only be used with list generated from the new "East Front" book in places were "Light Tanks" are allowed (basically a replacement option for the T-60 or T-70). They will use the following cost and stats:

BT-7 HQ 25

10 BT-7 225

9 BT-7 215

8 BT-7 195

7 BT-7 180

6 BT-7 160

5 BT-7 140

The stats would be:

BT-7 - Fearless Conscript

Fully Tracked, FA 1, SA 1, TA 1; 45mm: 24 ROF 2, AT 7, FP 4+

Co-ax MG, Limited Vision, Light Tank, Unreliable"

5. Max and Moritz.

A German Panzer Kompanie, Gepanzerte PanzerGrenadier or PanzerGrenadier Kompanie from the 3rd Panzer Division may use the Max and Moritz combo from "Mid-war Monsters." The force must be a "1942 Compliant" force taken from "East Front". If this option is taken the Experimental Tank Hunter Platoon option from page 26 of the "Mid-War Monsters" book may be used in lieu of a normal Tank-Hunter platoon slot from the three lists allowed.

6. Pavel Kamnev.

A Cossack Force may use the hero Pavel Kamnev from the Guards Cossack pdf (<http://www.flamesofwar.com/Portals/0/Documents/GvardeyskiyKazachiyPolk.pdf>). His cost is 50pts. This pdf is a Late War pdf but this hero is more historically appropriate to Mid-War since he died in December, 1942. So to honor this iconic hero, he will be allowed in this event,
